The livestreaming is once again included and is now a prerequisite of our finals, ensuring that those family and friends and barrel racing enthusiasts, can tune in to watch the action.

As the cream of the pot rise up our Fast Fifty in 24 in prime time, our streaming metrics peak as the live stream audience engage join us for the fast paced action. So too will our live web cast showcase seventy-five of our rising futurity horses who will battle it out over two rounds. We have double the nominations in this event and it is bound to be even more sensational than last year. The inclusion of a 2D futurity competition has attracted a bigger field and we are sure to see an electrifying expose of talent and breeding.

Again we acknowledge the hard work and dedication of Justin Gill for spotlighting our breeders and competitors who are eligible for the Stallion Incentive. This is our third year of incorporating the Stallion Incentive into the ABHA finals. Justin was the leading force behind the introduction of the incentive purse in Australia and has been a welcomed addition to the competition, so much so that the Australian Barrel Horse have

been fielding calls from other associations and events wanting to know more! Monies from our stallion service fee auctions plus the stallions paid in fees, result in a 10% ABHA retention, and the remaining 90% purse is spread across the Futurity, Maturity and Open competition at 30% for each of these events. At the time the newsletter went to print, we had a culmination of \$37,694.42 to be paid out without the inclusion of the rider nomination fees which also are directed back to the pot. To win an incentive pay out you do not necessarily have to win a division, it is paid to the highest placing paid in horse (by an incentive stallion) rider and the sire owner of each division and the highest placing paid in stallion and rider in the Futurity (1st & 2nd place to paid in riders and stallion owners) & Maturity (pays 1st -4th place for paid in riders and stallion owners).

It is an exciting time to be involved in barrel racing in Australia right now, this can be attributed to several factors and the hype of our finals is gaining momentum. The board join in wishing you all the best of luck over the four days of competition and safe travels to the ABHA 2024 Finals.

Michelle has also remained with the Equitana committee, organising and supporting this national event right though to her untimely death. It is evident from the comments from those who knew her most, all have commented on Michelle's big smile and willingness to help others learn and appreciate their horses.

MLTIE BELS & WIISTLES Megan McLoughlin




At this year's finals we have a very inspirational story with the extremely talented horsewoman, Megan McLoughlin who brings precision and timing in our sport to a whole new level.

Some may have heard about Megan already, for she has a need for speed like most of us, the only difference is she is legally blind and has been since the age of twenty-six. The old adage, "if you want something bad enough you will make it work", seems like a great saying but the practicality and hurdles to be legally blind and be competitive in the sport of barrel racing would be like climbing a mountain for others. Megan however takes it all in her stride, she first contacted the ABHA recently to explain what was required for her to compete at AELEC, which in fact, is very little. Her technique is based on echo location and therefore just needed to gain approval to have two whistle blowers on the exterior of the arena, one near the 2nd drum and the other at the third. Megan through trial and error has used other methods to negotiate her way around the pattern, one of those being the use of a head set communications with her two

assistants. This method detracted from Megan's ability to be in tune with her horse and believes that out of everything she has trialled thus far, echo location is what she has perfected is the best as it does not compromise the feel with her horse. Megan will sit with someone and will listen and count the hoof beats and strides from first to second, second to third and home which helps her prepare for her run. She runs with two hands around the whole pattern, to avoid becoming disorientated during her run. As I spoke to Megan it became apparent that prior to her becoming legally blind she was quite the horsewoman and hailed from a long line of generational and legendary cowboys and cowgirls from South Australia, the Willoughby family. She was born in the saddle and had an accomplished and decorated career in barrel racing as a Junior and open competitor. Megan won five Junior National Barrel Racing titles, two merit awards with the AQHA, eight APRA state barrel racing titles and an APRA Rookie barrel racing titles. In 2000-2003 Megan attended college in the United States and barrel raced through the ABAC in Georgia, USA and Megan recalls this as a great opportunity and wonderful time in her life.

Megan was a diagnosed as a Type One Diabetic. At the age of twenty-six she attended a clinic to have laser surgery on her eyes, unbeknown to her the laser machine had not been calibrated correctly and consequently lasered her eyes, sending 8000 hits into her eyes and leaving her with just 7% eye sight. Even twenty-seven operations in eight weeks, could not reverse the damage. They say lightning does not strike twice in the same place but only three months later Megan was diagnosed with ironically, a horse shoe kidney and was heading into renal failure. A kidney and pancreas transplant was required and once again Megan faced this head on, which is where her yearning to once again barrel race really kicked in again. Through her transplant she met legendary South Australian cowboy Steve Earnst, himself a good horseman and heart transplant recipient. Steve and Megan became good friends in 2018 when they were both involved in the cattle drive, Herd for Hope, where they moved the cattle onto Bondi Beach to raise funds and highlight rural health. It was here that Megan told Steve of her dream to once again



barrel race and she knew she needed that special horse to enable her to do so. Steve said he knew of the perfect horse just outside Tamworth. This was how Biccie found his way into Megan's life. His purchase for the purpose to train him on barrels was a bit of a secret, even to her family as this was part of her plan to once again compete in barrel racing Biscuit or Biccie as he is affectionately know is a 12 year old gelding, who Megan says she trusts more than most people and rightfully so. Biccie is by a quarter horse stallion, Oaks Spin out of a winning unregistered campdraft mare known as Image. He was purchased from Katrina Edwards, outside of Tamworth and is the horse Megan dreamed of to make a comeback to the sport of barrel racing. He is a quirky, sure footed gelding who is now running about half a second to a second off the front runners at South Australian APRA rodeo barrel races.

It has been a three year goal of Megan's to attend the ABHA finals and we welcome her with open arms, what a story. Biccie has commenced his journey on horse transport and today being 29th August, should arrive in Tamworth today. Megan has been beside herself worried about him as he travels ahead of her and is constantly checking in with the two different horse transport companies she has entrusted him. Megan flies into Tamworth with her sassy little eight year old and mature for her years daughter Ella who assists in guiding her mum around when needed along with her two friends, the whistle blowers this Saturday ahead of the finals.

Nine weeks ago Megan also had a right hip replacement, but she was sure that this was not going to stop her from attending the ABHA National Finals this year and a week after her return home she will undergo a breast mastectomy due to a breast cancer diagnosis. After speaking with Megan, I am in awe of her empowering journey which has taken incredible resilience, intellect and some of her stories point to the fact she has a wicked sense of humour. In true Megan style, she remarked that there are plenty worse off than her and she gets to be a mother to two beautiful children and get up in the morning and still do what she has always enjoyed. So if you hear the whistles at draw 212 of the Open Divisional competition in the AELEC stadium, know that this is Megan doing what she enjoys and come cheer her on. What a wonderful role model to us all.


